## 1. Introduction

Under data protection law, individuals have a right to be informed about how our Trust uses any personal data that we hold about them. We comply with this right by providing 'privacy notices' (sometimes called 'fair processing notices') to individuals where we are processing their personal data.

This privacy notice explains how we collect, store and use personal data about **individuals working with our Trust in a voluntary capacity, including Trustees** 

We, Birmingham Special Trusts' Co-operative Trust are the 'data controller' for the purposes of data protection law.

We are not required to have a Data Protection Officer but any enquiries should be made to the Project Lead.

# 2. The personal data we hold

Personal data that we may collect, use, store and share (when appropriate) about you includes, but is not restricted to:

- > Contact details
- > References
- > Employment details
- > Information about business and pecuniary interests

We may also collect, use, store and share (when appropriate) information about criminal convictions and offences.

We may also hold data about you that we have received from other organisations, including the Disclosure and Barring Service in respect of criminal offence data.

# 3. Why we use this data

We use the data listed above to:

- a) Establish and maintain effective governance
- b) Meet statutory obligations for publishing and sharing Trustees' details
- c) Facilitate safe recruitment, as part of our safeguarding obligations towards pupils in the Trust
- d) Undertake equalities monitoring
- e) Ensure that appropriate access arrangements can be provided for volunteers who require them

### 3.1 Use of your personal data for marketing purposes

Where you have given us consent to do so, we may send you marketing information by email or text promoting Trust events, campaigns, charitable causes or services that may be of interest to you.

You can withdraw consent or 'opt out' of receiving these emails and/or texts at any time by clicking on the 'Unsubscribe' link at the bottom of any such communication, or by contacting us (see 'Contact us' below).

### 3.2 Use of your personal data in automated decision making and profiling

We do not currently process any personal data through automated decision making or profiling. If this changes in the future, we will amend any relevant privacy notices in order to explain the processing to you, including your right to object to it.

# 4. Our lawful basis for using this data

Our lawful basis for processing your personal data for the purposes listed in section 3 above are as follows:

- a) For the purposes of establishing and maintaining effective governance, and meeting statutory obligations for publishing and sharing Trustees' details
- b)
- > in accordance with the 'legal obligation' basis we need to process data to meet our responsibilities under law as set out here:
  - Articles of Association: 10.1 The Trust must maintain a register of members

Where you have provided us with consent to use your data, you may withdraw this consent at any time. We will make this clear when requesting your consent, and explain how you would go about withdrawing consent if you wish to do so.

# 5. Collecting this data

While the majority of information we collect about you is mandatory, there is some information that can be provided voluntarily.

Whenever we seek to collect information from you, we make it clear whether you must provide this information (and if so, what the possible consequences are of not complying), or whether you have a choice.

### 6. How we store this data

We keep personal information about you while you volunteer for our Trust. We may also keep it beyond your work for our Trust if this is necessary.

We have put in place appropriate security measures to prevent your personal information from being accidentally lost, used or accessed in an unauthorised way, altered or disclosed.

We will dispose of your personal data securely when we no longer need it.

### 7. Who we share data with

We do not share information about you with any third party without consent unless the law and our policies allow us to do so.

Where it is legally required, or necessary (and it complies with data protection law), we may share personal information about you with:

- ➤ Our local authority Birmingham to meet our legal obligations to share certain information with it, such as safeguarding concerns
- > Government departments or agencies
- > Our regulator, Companies' House
- > Our auditors

# 8. Your rights

### 8.1 How to access personal information that we hold about you

You have a right to make a 'subject access request' to gain access to personal information that we hold about you.

If you make a subject access request, and if we do hold information about you, we will (subject to any exemptions that may apply):

- > Give you a description of it
- > Tell you why we are holding and processing it, and how long we will keep it for
- > Explain where we got it from, if not from you
- > Tell you who it has been, or will be, shared with
- > Let you know whether any automated decision-making is being applied to the data, and any consequences of this
- > Give you a copy of the information in an intelligible form

You may also have the right for your personal information to be transmitted electronically to another organisation in certain circumstances.

### 8.2 Your other rights regarding your data

Under data protection law, you have certain rights regarding how your personal data is used and kept safe. For example, you have the right to:

- > Object to our use of your personal data
- > Prevent your data being used to send direct marketing
- > Object to and challenge the use of your personal data for decisions being taken by automated means (by a computer or machine, rather than by a person)
- > In certain circumstances, have inaccurate personal data corrected
- > In certain circumstances, have the personal data we hold about you deleted or destroyed, or restrict its processing
- > In certain circumstances, be notified of a data breach
- > Make a complaint to the Information Commissioner's Office
- Claim compensation for damages caused by a breach of the data protection regulations

# 9. Complaints

We take any complaints about our collection and use of personal information very seriously.

If you think that our collection or use of personal information is unfair, misleading or inappropriate, or have any other concern about our data processing, please raise this with us in the first instance.
